A message from your President

Kathy and I had the tremendous honor of represent Missouri Bow Hunters at the National Archery Hall of Fame Induction Ceremony last month. This event was much more than I had ever expected. I have been in-

volved in archery and bow hunting for thirty years, and I have never attended anything that even came close to this Induction Ceremony. The people that were inducted, as well as the attendees, have accomplished so much and done so much more than I ever dreamed possible to promote and grow the sport of archery. I was honored to have a conversation with a gentleman from Australia who founded the Australian Archery Hall of Fame. He hunts all over the world and has also written several books. I guess the point I'm trying to make is thi: if you want this organization to not only survive, but to grow, each of us is going to have to help. There are a lot of ways to help. If you want to shoot fish, you will have to find some people to do the work. MBH has a bunch of people who donate a lot of their time to help make this enjoyable for everyone. A Word about Deer Diseases

This year, we have seen a substantial uptick past outbreaks. Luckily, not all deer that contract these diseases die. There are some signs of survival of EHD and Bluetongue that can be identified on a deer. Some deer acquire a regrowth of the hooves. In some cases, deer have sores inside their mouth on the dental pads and the inside of the formation from some reputable sources. The cheek. Most importantly, humans do NOT contract either hemorrhagic disease. The meat from a deer that is infected by these most part, the disease most deer have died by diseases are said to be of no health hazard. However, any animal in a poor, diseased ized term for both epizootic hemorrhagic discondition, regardless of the cause, may be unfit for consumption so be careful with any meat.

> Significant outbreaks have mainly happened during droughts, with past ones being in 1980, 1988, 1998 and 2007. As of mid-September, the MDC reports approximately 2,800 deer are dead due to hemorrhagic disease. According to numbers release by the MDC Osage County has been hit the hardest with 193 reported deer. Other counties with high counts are Benton with 116, Randolph with 107, Morgan with 92, Clay with 81, Monroe with 80 and Texas with 75. Reports within these counties tend to be localized to specific areas.

There are no cures or vaccines to cure these problems, but a cold winter normally kills of the disease by drastically reducing numbers of disease carrying midge flies.

I hope that this has been informative to everyone. This is simply one of those biological problems that come around from time to time. Something that nature brings and then takes away just as quickly. It simply runs its course and moves on just as long as normal winters continue. As much as I hate seeing deer pass from strange viruses such as these, this is the exact reason I am pursuing a career in wildlife biology. Informing other outdoorsmen and women of the biological effects we see from day to day is what I enjoy and hope to make it

A Home for Archery!

This year we've seen a blockbuster movie promoting the sport of archery, numerous TV shows showcasing our sport and the US Paralympic and Olympic archery teams have done an unbelievable job representing our country and introducing archery to millions via TV and the Internet. So how much better can it get!?!? If all that isn't enough, there's more...

Archery now has a permanent home! A history of the sport, priceless memorabilia and tributes to Archery Hall of Fame members all now reside under one roof and will soon be available for the world to see and enjoy. The Archery Hall of Fame Museum is located at Bass Pro Headquarters in Springfield, MO. This amazing tribute to the sport of archery will 'officially' open in its doors to the public in early 2013.

The Archery Hall of Fame was formed in 1971 to celebrate and recognize individuals who contributed to the sport of archery. The initial home of the of the AHOF was at the Fred Bear Museum in Grayling, MI. Over the years, induction ceremonies were held at numerous venues including the PAA, NAA and NFAA championships, the Pope & Young convention and Archery Trade Association (ATA) show.

In 2004 the Archery Hall of Fame & Museum, Inc. reached an agreement with the Wonders of Wildlife Museum to establish a permanent home for the AHOF at Bass Pro Shop's corporate headquarters and flagship store in Springfield, MO. In 2007 Ann and Early Hoyt pledged \$1,000,000. Now under the leadership of President M.R. James and Executive Director, Diane Miller the AHOF museum is nearly complete!

In mid September, I had the privilege of attending a preview of the museum and the induction ceremony for the classes of 2010 and 2011. A special thanks goes out to Gordon Composites and Saunders Archery for sponsoring a reception for the event.

As I browsed through the museum, I was amazed at the careful attention to detail in the presentation of the artifacts and information. The facility is absolutely state of the art and includes a combination of rich woodwork and glass that



seamlessly integrates with advanced lighting features, digital displays and polished metal. I was simply awestruck by the all the archery equipment and memorabilia on display. From Fred Bear's favorite hat,



Earl Hoyt's jacket and Ann Clark's petite sequined shooting outfit... to a priceless collection of bows that depict the evolution of archery. There was treasure to view from every angle.

That awestruck feeling persisted through the actual AHOF induction banquet and ceremony. The event was held in a meeting facility at the Bass pro Wonders of Wildlife campus. Nowhere else could one expect to see chandeliers made from stretched deer hides and a podium set amongst a wooded diorama complete with a full body bear mount, fallen trees and water features. As each of the new Inductees accepted their honors, one central theme was common... it was all about relationships. 

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THE DEATH OF FIELD ARCHERY - PART I

Hello fellow archers, many of you know me and have competed with me indoors and out. For those who don't, I will give you a little of my archery background.

I started shooting 42 years ago in 1970 at the young age of 27. A friend introduced me to indoor archery and, after my first 5 arrow end, I was hooked. I went out and bought a Bear Kodiak Special target bow, a dozen X7's and joined the NFAA and Missouri Bow Hunters, of which I have been a member ever since. By today's standards it was like using a 2X4 with limbs, but at the time it was beautiful and one of the better bows available for the money. (Back then compound bows were not in competition yet but by the National Field Tournament, it was used for the first win.) Since then I have competed in most of the Missouri State, Midwest Sectional, and a few National Field Archery Championships indoors and out. (I have not competed indoors locally since 2004, I retired and spend my winters in south Texas in an attempt to keep these old bones warm.) I served as NFAA Director for 4 years in the late '70's and was Midwest Councilman for 2 years after that. I opened and operated an Archery Shop for 2 years in Gladstone, Mo. in the early '80's. I have been the Missouri State and NFAA Midwest Indoor and Outdoor Field Champion and many 2nd and 3rd places competing in the Adult, Pro, Senior and Master Senior Freestyle divisions.

And now that brings me to the reason I have decided to write this article. I know that most of you are saying that Field Archery isn't dead. Well you're right, -- at least for now. I remember when it was common to have 80 to 100 shooters show up at a local club tournament. Now we are saying how great is to have 31 shooters at out State Field Championship. To me this is a sport on it's last leg and I would like to see it saved. In fact, I would like to see it thrive again before I'm on my last leg, and at my age that may not be far off. So, since I am now at an age that I don't have time to beat around the bush, I will be blunt from here on out. I also know that many of you will not agree with me and I will probably step on a few toes. For those toes I will apologize. However, change is never easy and some kind of change is needed and soon. Hopefully you will think about the things I bring up here, and come up with some ideas that will help save the sport that I have loved for so long.

So what can YOU do? Well, there are several things that I believe should, and must, be done to get attendance up, but it will not happen overnight. The first and the most important thing that MUST be done is, YOUR club MUST HOST at least one Field tournament a year. Don't have a field range??? Most club's that have a 3D range have the room to build a 14 target field range, and that's all you need. It can be built among the 3D targets, maybe at an angle so shooters can't use the field range to estimate the yardages for your 3D's. Four shooters to a target on a shotgun start = 56 shooters. The work to host a field shoot, once the range is built for your members, is minimal. Unlike 3D you don't have to put out, and take in 20 animals, (3 hours up and 2 to 3 hours down, plus storage) you just put up fresh targets on the bails that are already there (30 minutes) and then after the shoot is over they are left up for the members to shot. Yes, there is some maintenance with having a field range, but it really isn't that much; some mowing and branch cleanup. If the bales need rebuilding because of shooting thru, then your members are using them. That's a win - win to me. I know many of you are saying that there aren't enough shooters that come to a field shoot. Well there never will be if we don't do something to revive it. YOU should attend field shoots with the same fervor that you show for 3D. It shouldn't be one or the other, it should be both. If field archery is to survive we can't rely on only 2 clubs that currently host 1 invitational each. (Northside and IBH) We need more tournaments for practice before the State and Sectional Field Championships. The clubs that have field leagues can't seem to get those same shooters to show up for a tournament, even at their own club. Why? Are you afraid that you can't compete with the better shooters? How many 3D's do you attend that you believe you can and will win? If your ears are burning, how are your toes? You will notice I have stressed YOU! That's because without YOU, and your effort, there will never be any change. On your practice range, do you always shoot at animal targets, or do you practice and set your sights on field, or at least some sort of spot targets? Talk it over with others at the 3D's, practice or wherever you normally discuss archery. Slam my ideas, I don't care, at least you will be talking about how we can save this sport and make it thrive again. Want to give me your ideas or tell me how screwed up I am? So I don't bore you too much, I will leave you with this for now, and step on more toes next month.

CONSERVATION COMMITTEE

Hope all is going well with the 2012 archery season. This month I would like to talk about the annual Missouri Department of Conservation's Bowhunter Observation Survey. Since 1983 several thousand Missouri archery deer & turkey hunters volunteered to keep daily sighting records of deer, turkey, & furbearers they have seen while hunting. Bowhunter are asked to record the number of hours they hunted, during both morning and evening hunts, and to use a standardized daily diary to record sighting of wildlife. The MDC uses the number of sightings of each species divided by the total number of hours hunted statewide to calculate a sighting rate, and this is then expressed as the number of sighting per 1,000 hunter hours to calculate

This information helps biologists gauge he health of wildlife populations and set hunting regulations. Hunter retention rates are very high and only occasional sign-ups are needed to maintain sufficient hunter hours. The hunters are well distributed statewide, with volunteer hunters in 112 of 114 counties during most years. Hunter hours averaged 52,781 hours over the last 28 years, and they ranged from a low of 30,990 in 1985 to a high of 84,497 in 1988. If you are interested in being part of the survey you can contact MDC employee Paul Rogers via email paul.roger@mdc.mo.gov_or you can send your name and address to ; Bowhunter Observation Survey, Missouri Department of Conservation, 3500 East Gans Road, Columbia, MO

MDC will send you a dairy to record your observations. At the end of the season, drop the postage paid diary in the mail. Once Conservation Department biologists tally the information, they'll return your diary along with a summary of sightings for the entire state.

If you would like to look at the latest available survey numbers you can find them at <u>www.mdc.mo.</u> <u>gov/hunting-trapping/huntingoutlooks-and-reports</u>. Just click on the Furbearer Annual Report and go to the Archers Index which lists by Country the number of wildlife sightings per 1000 hours listed by species.
