CONSERVATION COMMITTEE REPORT

On August 19th myself and MBH member Kurt Surber attended the third annual Conservation Federation of Missouri's Affiliate Summit in Springfield representing Missouri Bow Hunters Association. I am pleased to announce that Kurt has agreed to serve on the CFM's Board of Directors as well. That appointment gives MBH another voice for bow hunters. I will continue to serve on the board also as the MBH affiliate board member. This year's summit was held in Springfield. For those of you that have never heard of the CFM organization here's a little history lesson. In 1935, sportsmen from throughout Missouri came together to form the Conservation Federation of Missouri (CFM). They organized with the purpose of taking conservation out of politics. Their initiative petition campaign resulted in the creation of the Missouri Department of Conservation, a non-political conservation agency that has been a model for other states. Since then, the Federation has undertaken many successful battles to ensure Missouri continues to be the leading state in conservation policies and funding. In 1976, CFM spearheaded successful passage of the conservation sales tax to create stable broadbased funding for Missouri's forests, fauna and fish. Programs like Operation Game Thief, Stream Teams, and Share the Harvest were all programs started by CFM. Today CFM is the largest and most representative conservation group in Missouri. It is a citizen's organization with over 84 affiliated clubs and over 4,500 individual members all across the state. The Missouri Bow Hunters Association is one of those affiliated clubs. MBH pays CFM \$500 each year to be an affiliate club, for that money we get a significate citizens voice in managing and preserving Missouri's conservation resources and outdoor heritage. As an affiliated club we team up with the other clubs to present a powerful voice for Missouri Conservation not only with our state legislature and conservation department but also nationally. At the affiliate summit this year there were 25 different clubs represented as well as folks from the Missouri Department of Conservation, Natural Resources, State Parks, US Fish & Wildlife Service, Natural Resources Conservation Service (NRCS), and National Wildlife Federation. The affiliate clubs represented Archery, Turkey, Deer, Duck, & Upland Game Hunting, Large & Smallmouth Bass & Trout Fishing, Trapping, Meat Processors, Foresters, Corn & Soybean Growers, Native Seed Groups, Prairie Habitat, State Parks, Bird Watching, Missouri Electric Cooperatives, and Native Seed Gardening. So it's safe to say that the CFM is made up of a very diverse group of people all interested in protecting and improving Missouri's Outdoors. The objective of this summit is to gather as many groups as possible to exchange ideas and spread the word to our various members to increase awareness and participation in CFM and it's goal statement; Mission: To ensure conservation of Missouri's wildlife and natural resources, and preservation of our state's rich outdoor heritage through advocacy, education and partnerships.

Highlights from the summit;

LEGISLATION -No legislation in the Missouri Congress this year was passed that would affect Conservation. There were two bills that could have had an effect but neither passed out of committee. The first would have negatively impacted conservation efforts by increasing the Conservation Commission from 4 to 8 members and making each member represent a district of the state. The present Conservation Commission is 4 members that are responsible for approving or declining conservation topics and representing the entire state instead of just one part of the state. The second bill was one that we supported and would have increased fines for poaching game animals. One other thing of note is the race for the Missouri Governor this year. CFM's leadership feels like we have a win-win situation in the gubernatorial race this year. Both Democratic candidate Chris Koster and Republican candidate Eric Greitens are known supporters of conservation efforts and are both outdoor enthusiasts and sportsmen.

Youth Conservation Initiatives – Jen Sampsell was hired this past spring as the Education and Outreach Coordinator at CFM. Jen is really ramping up CFM's efforts to get high school juniors and seniors and college age students more involved in conservation. She has updated a program called Conservation Leadership Corps (CLC) as well as organising

and communicating to Missouri Colleges about another program call Missouri Collegiate Conservation Alliance (MCCA). The CLC is dedicated to developing and helping youth to get training and experience as well as networking with current conservation leaders so that they can follow a career path of working full or part time in the conservation/wildlife field. The MCCA is a college campus group dedicated to providing a unified voice for college students to become knowledgeable about and engage in efforts on behalf of conservation in Missouri. Both of these programs are the envy of other states and are being copied to start in those states as well.

Vote Yes on Amendment #1 – We next heard from the Missouri State Parks Director Bill Bryan about the newest State Park – Echo Bluffs in the Ozarks. From all accounts it's the crown jewel of state parks. You also need to know that in the November Elections you will be asked to vote on Amendment #1. A YES vote on this amendment will continue the 1/10th of one percent sales tax for Missouri Parks, Soils, and Water that has been in effect since 1984 and has been reapproved by voters 3 more time in 1988, 1996, and 2006. This tax costs the average Missourian about \$14 per year. The tax is divided equally between soil and water conservation efforts and Missouri state parks and historic sites. The tax provides about 75% of the park systems budget to operate and improve parks and historic sites and is required by law to be voter approved for renewal every 10 years.

WOLF School – CFM treated the affiliate representatives to a great sit down dinner and social hour. After dinner we heard from some of the WOLF School students. Wonders of the Ozarks Learning Facility (WOLF) School is a Springfield public school for fifth graders who have an interest in the outdoors. WOLF mission is to achieve academic excellence through a rigorous academic core program, in the context of the outdoors and conservation science, which installs a sense of integrity and respect of the natural world. It was amazing to hear these 5th graders stand up in front of a room of people and talk about this wonderful school opportunity. In conclusion I just wanted to add a plug for joining the Conservation Federation of Missouri. For more than 75 years, CFM has been known as "The Voice for Missouri's Outdoors." From hunters to hikers, birders to mountain bikers, outdoor novices to outdoor veterans, CFM provides a platform for a diverse group of individuals and businesses to have their conservation voice be heard. Individual memberships are \$35 and family memberships are \$60. There are lots of benefits for CFM members not to mention the satisfactions you get from knowing you're helping all things in the Missouri Outdoors! LARGE & SMALL GAME COMMITTEE

As I write this article it's September 20th and no one has submitted any deer or turkey reports yet for the 2016 season, I haven't made it out hunting yet but have plans to this coming weekend. September always seems to bet too hot and buggy in Missouri for me to get excited about archery hunting. I guess I need to spend a little more time pattering early season deer so I would be ready for the early season.

If you read last month's article you'll remember we talked about the 1980 archery season and I promised to review the 1990 season in this month's edition.

In 1990 archery season ran from October 1 until December 31(same as in 1980) however your archery tag allowed you two deer of either sex. One deer could be harvested before firearms season and one after firearms season. You could harvest two more deer with archery tackle if you used your bow during the 9 day firearms season and tagged it with your firearms permits. There were 83,723 archery permits issued that year *(almost twice as many as in 1980)* with a deer harvest of 11,118 *(over 3 times greater than 1980)* for an 13.3% success rate *(increase of over 5% from 1980)*. The archery harvest was 6.4% *(compared to 7% in 1980)* of the total deer harvest which was 172,975 deer in 1990 *(again over 3 times greater than 1980)* harvest). So a summary of the 1990 archery season would be twice as many bowhunters harvested three times more deer with an increased success rate of over 5% while still only being less than 7% of the total deer kill as compared to 1980.

Again let's compare the 1990 season to the 2014 season. In 2014 you could hunt with archery tackle from September 15 until January 15, thirty more days than in 1990. Your archery tag allowed you two deer and two turkey of either sex with the option to purchase as many antlerless permits as you wanted. You could harvest more deer with archery tackle if you used your bow during the 11 day firearms season and tagged it with your firearms permits. There were 189,452 individuals who possessed archery permits in 2014 with a deer harvest of 48,449 for a 26% success rate. The archery harvest was 23% of the total deer harvest which was 206,640 deer in 2014. So in 2014 there were **2.3** times more archery hunters, they killed **4.4** times more deer, with a **16%** increased success rate than in 1990.

There were 73 different MBH members (*compared to 130 in 1980*) that turned in deer reports. 12 members (*compared to 21 in 1980*) turned in turkey harvest reports.

Nine members filled 3 deer tags that year and 13 members filled 2 deer tags in 1990.

Four MBH members documented 4 kills in 1990.

Coy Dollens killed 3 deer (1 Buck, 2 Does) and a Jake turkey. The deer were in Monroe Co. and the turkey in Audrain. Randy Hamilton killed 2 does and 2 turkeys all in Audrain County.

Steve Williams killed 2 deer and 2 turkeys all in Texas County.

Don Witte killed 3 Bucks and 1 Hen turkey all in Gasconade County.

No less than fourteen members reported kills in 1980 and 1990. Those members were; Charles Baker, Bill Beissenherz, Jerry Decker, Dennis Duncan, Paul Jefferies, Bob Kieffer, Hustan Martin, Leonard Newton, Dean Qualls, Larry Strack, Frank Toliver, Johnny Washam Sr, Bill Wood, and Dick Wood.

The average shot was 20 yards much the same as today's average shot distance. The average experience of MBH members was 15 seasons.

Here are some interesting facts about the MBH members' choice of archery tackle in 1990.

Compound Bows accounted for 97% of the kills. The top Compound Bow used was Hoyt followed closely by PSE with Oneida coming in a distant third.

Only 4 harvests were from Traditional recurves or longbows. Martin bows got 3 kills and Black Widow got 1. The use of Traditional archery gear had greatly diminished in the last 10 years. Also archers in Missouri who were still using traditional gear had migrated to a new Missouri Bowhunting organization that was established in 1987 called the United Bowhunters of Missouri. Most of those members believed that technical advancements in archery equipment had gone too far and they were working to keep traditional archery alive in Missouri.

The average bow draw weight was 65.8 pounds a full 5 pounds heavier than 1980 bow weight.

99% used aluminum arrows almost all of those were Easton. There were a few fiberglass and wood arrows.

100% used fixed blade broadheads. The top 3 brands were NAP, Rocky Mountain, and Wasp.

81 game kills were documented from treestands, 15 by still hunting, 14 by stalking, 3 from a blind, 1 driving, with 4 unknown. Morning and evening hunt kills were equal at 59 each in 1990. Private land hunting was becoming more successful by 1990 as 85% of the kills were on private land and only 15% on public. In 1980 that ratio was 63% private land compared to 37% public land.

The Missouri archery season statistics were found by searching the Missouri Department of Conservations website at https://mdc.mo.gov/. The 1990 MBH member's statistics were compiled from Missouri Bow Hunters Association large game reports that are currently in my possession. I would like to encourage MBH members to submit their large game harvests for the 2016 season so that the MBH historical record can continue. You can submit your reports by going to the MBH website at http://mobowhunters.org/ and clicking on the Game Awards tab, then filling out the Large Game App and submitting it.

I will be listing the successful MBH members each month of the 2016 season in our monthly Release newsletter. You can also send me your reports and pictures at my email below. Hopefully by next months newsletter I'll have some 2016 success stories, until then.
